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## HEADQUARTERS 46TH MEDICAL BATTALION ARMORED A.P.O. 254, U.S. Army

## AFTER ACTION REPORT Poriod 1 July - 31 July 1944

The Loth Medical Battalion was alerted for movement and the first few days were used in preparation for the move from the United Kingdom to the Continent.

Company "A" under the command of Captain Brooks H. Bishop, left the Base Camp for movement to the marshalling area at 0830, 7 July 1944. They were to accompany CC "B" on the move.

On 10 July at 0630 Hq & Hq Co, B Company and C Company left for the mershalling area arriving there at approximately 1130, 10 July. Hq & Hq Co, and Co C were in one Camp at the mershalling area and Company b in another.

On 13 July the unit left the marshalling area for ship loading. The ships arrived at Utah Beach in the afternoon of 14 July and debarkation began at 2330 that night. After a blackout drive the Battalion ninus A Company arrived in the assembly area near St. Germain at 0530. At 1200 the same day the Battalion left the assembly area near St. Germain, moved west to an area approximately .8 miles southeast of Fierville where it moved into a bivouac area with Company A.

The Fourth Armored Division was ordered into action at 1100 17 July. Combat Command B moved to a position in the vicinity of Haffeville (333794) to replace the Fourth Infantry Division. Company B of this unit with Captain Joseph C. Mauceri commanding were in support of Combat Command B. The Clearing Station was set up southwest of Meautis (344815) to handle casualise brought back by the Collecting platoon which was set up with an advanced Collecting Point at 325793.

At 0945, 18 July, he & He Company, A Company and C Company moved out of the assembly area with Division Trains and moved east to a new bivouse area .5 miles East of Cantepie. Company C set up a Division Rest Area in conjunction with Major Mericle, Division Psychiatrist.

The front line of the Division remained static until 28 July.

During this day period the Battalion handled approximately 450 patients. Some of these were exhaustion cases and many were returned to duty after a few days rest in the C Company Area.

On the 28th of July the Division moved south to attack the enemy. At this time Company A replaced Company B in support of CC B and Company B was placed in support of CC A. Company C was held in reserve for the Division Trains area with Hq & Hq Co.

Company A followed CC B closely and handled all of the casualties which were transferred to Evacuation and Field Hospitals by First Army Ambulances. Some of the minor wounded and the exhaustion cases were transferred to Company C who treated them until they were able to return to duty or required further evacuation. A Company first set up north of Periers. B Company moved out later and had no opportunity to establish a Clearing Station due to the rapidity of the advance however they did handle the casualties en route. The advance continued and A Company set up just north of Coutances on the 29th of July. The same day they moved to a new location south of Coutances.

At 1330 30 July, Hq & Hq Co and C Company left the bivouse area near Cantepie and moved south in Division Trains to an area South of Coutances (259473) arriving there at 1130 31 July. During this time Company B continued moving south.

During the actions the Medical Companies rendered medical support to the Division handling more than 450 casualties. Since the start of theconcerted drive south launched 28 July and undetermined number of allied, civilians and enemy casualties were handled.

The moi to of the Battalion is very high with the successes of the Division.
