SUBJECT: After Action Report, Period 1-31 March 1945.

TO : The Adjutant General, United States Army, Washington,  
25, D. C. (Through Channels)

1. The month of March saw renewed activity on a broad scale. Movements were made rapidly and often. Company A again remained in support of Combat Command A and Company B remained in support of Combat Command B. Company C functioned as the Reserve Medical Company. Ambulance relay points were again established during periods when tactical advances necessitated such operations. Renewed enemy air and ground activity was more noticeable as the Division moved forward into Germany after crossing the Rhine River.

3. Forward thrusts of the Division created a problem in supply and evacuation by extending lines through not completely cleared territory. This was solved by maintaining close liaison with Division Headquarters for check on all routes. Since routes often led through uncertain territory, evacuation was performed in instances under the protection of armored trains. Autobahns were used in place of secondary roads to speed evacuation.


