TO : The Adjutant General, United States Army, Washington,
25, D.C. (Through Channels).

1. Combat activity was extremely limited during the month of May. The end of the war in Europe was swiftly approaching a climax. Official notification of the cessation of hostilities as arranged for by the Allied powers was received at 1300 7 May 1945. Movements of the Battalion were few, coinciding with the approach of the cessation of hostilities. Company A still supported Combat Command A, medically and Company B still supported Combat Command B, medically. Company C retained its function as the reserve medical Company.

2. Movements of the elements of the Battalion during May were as follows:

7 May Strelske-Hostice, Czechoslovakia
28 May-Kelheim, Germany
- B. Company A
5 May--Grattersdorf, Germany
7 May--Strakonice, Czechoslovakia
28 May-Kelheim, Germany
- C. Company B
5 May--Hengersberg, Germany
7 May--Horazdovice, Czechoslovakia
28 May-Kelheim, Germany.
