Subject: A Brief History of the 46th Medical Battalion (Armd).

To : G-2, 4th Armored Division, Pine Camp, New York.

1. In compliance with unnumbered memorandum, Headquarters 4th Armored Division, dated Sept. 15/41, the following history of the 46th Medical Battalion (Armd) is submitted:

The 46th Medical Battalion (Armd), under the command of Major George Horsfall, came into existence on April 15, 1941 with the activation of the 4th Armored Division at Pine Camp, New York. Its original cadre of 110 enlisted men and 18 officers was drawn from the 47th Medical Battalion (Armd) of the 1st Armored Division and provided a nucleus of trained, seasoned medical troops. The organization rapidly expanded, attaining its full strength of 316 enlisted men and 25 officers by June 3rd.

The arrival of large numbers of recruits necessitated an intensive basic training program, which was conducted entirely by the battalion officers and non-commissioned officer personnel, over a three months period ending August 23, 1941. This program was carefully designed to emphasize medical-military subjects with numerous field exercises demonstrating the varied problems: litter drill, clearing station administration, field medicine, field sanitation, splinting, etc. Individual aptitudes permitted many enlisted men to receive further specialized training at the various army schools providing the battalion with a well trained staff of medical, dental, surgical, and veterinary technicians; first aid men; motor mechanics; cooks and bakers, etc.

An innovation in training medical personnel was inaugurated in September, 1941 whereby the soldier serves a one months "interneship" at the Pine Camp Station Hospital, to obtain practical experience in the fields of surgery, medicine, and nursing. Twenty men of the battalion have successfully completed the courses, and 30 more are at present detached to the hospital for this work.

The tactical functioning of the battalion as an organized unit was begun as early as May 20, 1941, with the completion of a 130 mile mounted road march; extensive convoy operations have since been conducted weekly and under varied conditions: river crossing (July 9), black-out driving and bivouac procedure (July 16). This Successful operation of the battalion on convoy-bivouac procedure enabled the organization to participate in 3 day extended road marches during August, September and October, involving distances of 400 miles, with maintenance of supply and communication lines to Pine Camp. On September 7, 1941 the battalion sent an experienced cadre of 32 enlisted men and 4 officers to activate the 45th Medical Battalion (Armd) of the 5th Armored Division, stationed at Fort Knox, Ky. BATTALION HISTORY OCTOBER 1, 1941 to JANUARY 5, 1942

Original Unit: 46th Medical Battalion (Armd)

Redesignation: 46th Armored Medical Battalion, G. O. No. 1, Headquar-

ters 4th Armored Division, Pine Camp, N.Y., Jan. 5, 1942.

Command: Major George Horsfall, commanding officer, was detailed to duty as an umpire in southern maneuvers and Captain Herbert H. Kerr, M.C., assumed command (par. 6, S.O. No. 66, Headquarters 46th Medical Battalion (Armd).) on October 30, 1941. Captain Kerr was detailed to duty at Edgewood Arsenal and Captain William M. O'Brien assumed command (par. 1 S.O. No. 77, Headquarters 46th Medical Battalion (Armd)) from November 28, 1941 until Major Horsfall returned on December 12, 1941.

Strength: The strength of this organization on October 1, 1941 was: Officers - 26; enlisted men - 284. Major changes occurred when five officers and 28 enlisted men were transferred from the Medical Detachment 80th Armored Regiment (M) (par. 2 S.O. No. 3, Headquarters 4th Armored Division, January 3, 1942). On January 5, 1942 the strength was: Officers - 24; enlisted men - 224.

- Training: 1. General Training from October 1, 1941 to January 5, 1942 consisted of a review of basic, technical and Medical Department technical subjects. More emphasis was placed on tactical training in which company and battalion functions were stressed.
- 2. Marches on October 1, 2, 3, 1941 a 438 mile mounted road march was made by the entire battalion to Saratoga Springs, N.Y., and Lost Pond (near Saranac Lake, N.Y.) Daily mileages were 157, 131 and 150. Particular attention was paid to convoy driving and bivouac procedure. Experience was gained in bivouacing, messing and driving in heavy rain. On October 27, 28, and 29 a mounted road march was made to Ft. Niagara, N.Y., and returned with the same training objectives as the march mentioned above. Weather conditions were generally good on this march. Distances covered 1st day 126 miles, 2nd day 150 miles, 3rd day 235 miles.
- 3. Other training. Since October 1, 1941, approximately 20 men have been on special duty at the Station Hospital, Pine Camp, N.Y., each month for training in Medical Department technical subjects.

BATTALION HISTORY - 1 NOVEMBER - 30 NOVEMBER

The Battalion had normal training for the first two (2) weeks of the month. A Retreat Parade was held and Driver's Medals were presented to the men.

On 15 November the Commanding General spoke to the entire Division and told the men that the 4th Armored Division was alerted. After that date the entire Division spent all of the time getting all men P.O.M. qualified. A complete check of all clothing and equipment was made to determine the serviceability and Requisitions were submitted for all shortages. The physically unfit men were eliminated and the Battalion brought to T/O strength.

On 23 November a 100% check of the Service Records was made by the Inspector General and the errors noted are being corrected.

The strength of the Battalion 1 November was twenty-nine Officers assigned; two Officers unassigned; two Warrant Officers assigned and one Warrant Officer unassigned, and three hundred and ninety-one Enlisted Men assigned and two Enlisted Men unassigned. On 30 November the strength was, twenty-nine Officers assigned; two Officers unassigned; two Warrant Officers assigned; one Warrant Officer unassigned; three hundred and ninety-four Enlisted Men assigned and two Enlisted Men attached unassigned.

BATTALION HISTORY (1 DECEMBER- 31 DECEMBER)

For the first new days of the month the Battalion conducted showdown inspections and further prepared for Overseas Movement. The area in Camp Bowie was turned over to the Advanced Detachment of the 83rd Medical Battalion, Armored, 13th Armored Division.

On 18 December 1943 the Battalion left camp Bowie, via rail for camp Myles Standish, mass. arriving there approximately 0100 Wednesday, 22 December.

At Camp Myles Standish, shortages in equipment and clothing were made up and the Battalion received the first two shots of typhus innoculation. rurther necessary details were completed and on 29 December 1943 the Battalion departed Camp Myles Standish for Overseas Movement. The Battalion sailed on three ships, in the afternoon of 29 December.

Upon departure from the continental limits of the United States the Battalion was at T/O strength, four men having been dropped in the staging area and four men picked up.
