

The major portion of this period was given over to training and preparation for future tactical operations. During this phase personnel were afforded pass privileges and recreational facilities. Supply and maintenance were stressed. On 15 February an ambulance belonging to Company C was attacked and strafed by a P-51 with American markings. The ambulance was shot up but neither the driver nor the assistant driver sustained any injuries. The incident was reported to G-2 for investigation. Headquarters and Headquarters Company moved into the field on 28 February since no suitable billets could be found in villages. On this day the weather was mild.
