HISTORICAL RECORD OF 46TH ARMORED MEDICAL BATTALION FOR PERIOD O1 JULY 45 TO 31 JULY 45

I. Organization.

A. 46th Armored Medical Battalion, APO 254, U. S. Army, organized 15 Apr 41 at Pine Camp, N. Y., under T/O & E 8-75, WD. dated 21 Nov 44.

B. Changes in organization: on 23 July 45 all personnel with an A. S. R. score of 85 or more were transferred for subsequent redeployment to the U. S. to the 9th Armored Division. Later, a few remaining who had 85 or more points were transferred to the 14th Armored Division. These transfers were made on a man-for-man basis, i.e. each individual transferred was to be replaced by an individual with like MOS with an A. S. R. score less than 85 in case of Officers and less than 80 in case of Enlisted Men.
